

## Aid to Africa and the UK's '2005 agenda': perspectives of European donors and implications for Japan

The Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) are currently funding research coordinated by the ODI to provide an overview of debates in the UK, France, Germany and the European Union concerning aid policy to Africa and the implications for Japan. These debates are of particular significance because the UK holds the Presidency of the EU and is hosting the G8 Summit in July, which has African development as a key focus.

The preliminary findings of the research will be discussed in a one-day workshop with senior Japanese researchers (Professor Motoki Takahashi and Professor Izumi Ohno), Japanese aid officials and other UK stakeholders on African development. The aim of the workshop is to identify different positions around key aid policy issues and the implications for Japan's aid to Africa.
