This is a small-group interactive class for people directly engaged or deeply interested in policy making in developing countries.

Lack of leadership, poor coordination and weak implementation are common features of policies in many developing countries, but some governments solve these problems better than others. This course aims to offer a practical and comparative perspective on policy methodology (how policies should be made and executed) for government officials engaged in policy formulation. We will look at concrete international—especially East Asian and African—experiences. We are also interested in transition dynamics from the existing system to the desired system. Our purpose is not just to describe policy problems. We want to analyze policymaking from an institutional viewpoint, and through case studies and international comparison.

Class is conducted in a small-group setting. Each session consists of a kick-off presentation of a featured idea/case by an instructor, followed by discussion by all participants. Instructors will take turns in leading the discussion. Lecture slides are downloadable from the lecture website shown above (subject to revision and updating at any time). Some lectures have accompanying reading materials. Toward the end of the course, some (or all) students will be asked to present their policy analyses based on their own experiences.

This course uses materials and findings from policy research in many Asian and African countries including policy dialogue in Vietnam and Ethiopia conducted by the GRIPS Development Forum headed by the instructors of this course, in cooperation with the Japanese MoFA, JICA and other agencies.

Requirements

Students must have practical experience, concrete knowledge and/or deep interest in policymaking in their countries or other developing countries. The knowledge of development economics and global development trends are useful, but not required. Students should participate actively in discussion.

Grading

Student score = (Attendance, 0-50) + (Participation, 0-50) + (Optional presentation, from -50 to +50)

Grading is based on attendance and participation in all sessions. There will be no exam or term paper. Late arrival and absence from class will count negatively. Absence without prior notification is not allowed except in sudden emergency. In addition, some students can volunteer (or be asked) to do presentations on the policy experiences of their countries or countries they have worked in. They will receive additional positive points if the presentation is good. But if it is poor, it will count negatively on your grade (in reality, very few students received negative points for presentation so far). Non-presenters receive zero points.

Attendance, participation and (optional) presentation are all normalized and added with equal weights. Letter grades will depend on the summed score of each student subject to the GRIPS grading rules (we cannot give "A" to all students even if they all perform well, for example).
